<p><b>CALM (Moldova): Representation of LGs interests and influence on politicians – holistic approach</b></p> <p>Integral unity of three elements - institutional building, dialogue with national government and international advocacy - determines and generates the strength of association</p> <p><b>NALAG (Ghana): Internal reforms for a stronger association</b></p> <p>The association have built a good reputation both nationally and internationally as a result of the implementation of a good practices to run its affairs.</p> <p><b>DST (Germany): Ensuring political and financial independence of the Association of German Cities</b></p> <p>The DST applies different mechanisms to make sure it maintains its independence both on a financial and political level.</p>	<p><b>United Cities Lebanon: The National Program of Support to Lebanese Municipalities</b></p> <p>Objectives of the program: Strengthening the recognition of municipalities in Lebanon; Strengthening the Lebanese municipal institution</p> <p><b>SALGA (South Africa): SALGA's representation role in intergovernmental relations</b></p> <p>Participation by SALGA government in national and provincial intergovernmental processes; and SALGA to be consulted on all matters that materially affect local government's functions</p> <p><b>DST (Germany): Sustainable funding for public traffic</b></p> <p>Public traffic needs efficient and stable state funding for modernization, accessibility, digital development, infrastructure and rolling stock for a better environment and against climate change</p>

<p><b>SCTM (Serbia): Establishment and functioning of SCTM Networks</b></p> <p>SCTM brings together local representatives around specific topics of LSG interests. The new mechanism is created for both providing and collecting information regarding new legislation and policies to and from the local level</p> <p><b>DST (Germany): Financing local expenditures for Refugees</b></p> <p>Due to rising numbers of refugees arriving in Germany a new structure for financing local expenditures for refugee care had to be established.</p> <p><b>AMPE (Peru): Program of Incentives for the Improvement of Municipal Management</b></p>	<p><b>ALAT (Tanzania): Mayors Award Scheme</b></p> <p>Appreciation of the outstanding performance of the Mayors; includes Nomination and Application, Assessment and adjudication, Profiling and best practice dissemination, Feedback and capacity building</p> <p><b>ANAMM (Mozambique): Strengthening the capacities of municipal assemblies (councilors) through peer learning</b></p> <p>Municipal assemblies members (councilors) benefited from training sessions facilitated by other skilled councilors (members of ANAMM).</p> <p><b>AACT (Austria): Development of multiple online tools for cities in order to meet the new data protection standards</b></p> <p>The General Data Protection Regulation entered into force on 25th of May 2018 and raised wide-ranging new responsibilities for local authorities in Austria. The AACT started a couple of initiatives to support all of its members with guidelines and tools for a better implementation of the new and comprehensive regulation.</p>
