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bottom-up: Local/municipal level in German Municipalities

Municipal context in Germany:

- municipal development cooperation is a voluntary task
- limited personal and financial resources (financial constraints of municipalities)
- challenge: gaining support within the administration and the council

at the same time: Globalisation is shaping the reality of local governments

2. Starting point/Project goal

What was the main challenge, issue, problem to be addressed by the project? Were all genders affected by the issue in the same way?

- Develop capacities of municipalities' employees in the implementation of the Agenda 2030
- all genders are addressed

What was the target of the project?

- By the end of 2021
 - ca. 200 municipalities signed the specimen resolution "The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development: Building Sustainability at the Local Level"
 - 50 towns, municipalities and districts in North Rhine-Westphalia, Schleswig-Holstein and Thuringia had incorporated the SDGs into everyday administrative life.
 - 30 municipalities have developed a sustainability strategy



3. Approach

Which methods, tools or instruments have been developed and were applied to address the challenge?

- Analysis (quantitative and qualitative)
- awareness-raising (publications incl. factsheets etc.)
- Core groups and steering groups & participation processes
Breaking up silos: bringing different mun. departments at one table
- Networking to share best practices and failures

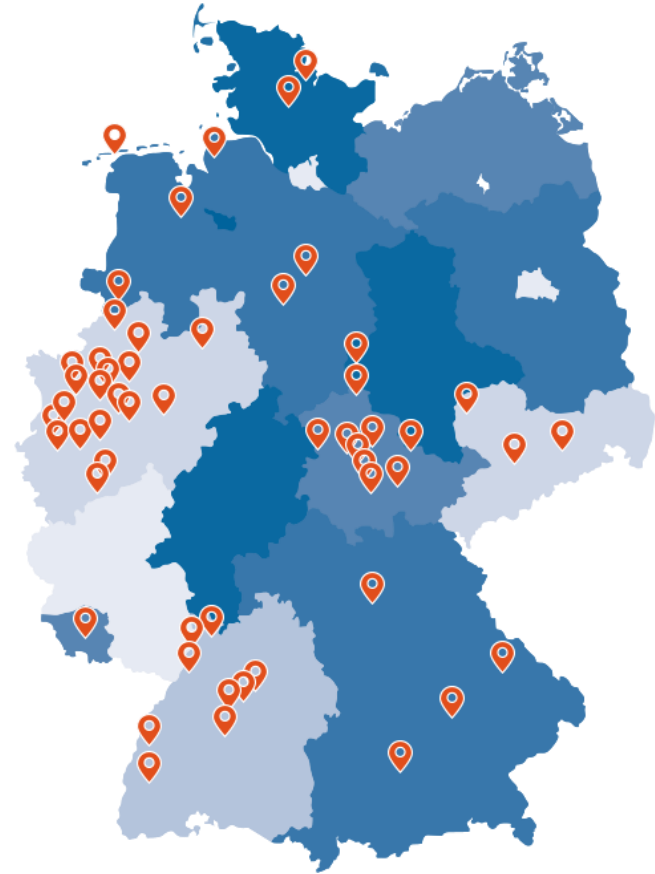

- Online Community „Club of Agenda 2030“
- SDGs are interlinked and in all projects

4. Outputs

- 150 municipalities have signed the Resolution for Sustainable Development.
- Strategic approaches of Municipalities for Global Sustainability are being implemented in 7 federal states
- Local sustainability strategy have been developed in 37 municipalities
- Quantitative and qualitative analysis of SDGs
- Awareness raising for SDGs
- Activities at local level for a global sustainable city
- Participation processes for municipality and civil society



5. Lessons learnt

- not picking all SDGs on the same time, only picking 3-4
- good communication: better a small message, than none
- transparency
- openminded for transformation
- Have a plan and begin with the implementation

Further plan of the project

Making ourselves (=project of Municipalities for Global Sustainability) superfluous/redundant – because the German municipalities that have worked in the project will be enabled to do it on their own and multiply on their own.
