- Tokyo's Measures Concerning Stranded People -

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1. Profile of Tokyo

TOKYO

- Capital of Japan with population of over 13 million
- Center of Politics and Economy
- Headquarters of major companies are concentrated in Tokyo
- Long distance commuters

There is a 70% possibility of an earthquake directly hitting Tokyo within the next 30 years.

Goal of Disaster Management Measures in Tokyo

- To Save People's Lives
- To Maintain the Function of Capital

2. Great East Japan Earthquake

March 11, 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake

- Stranded Persons
- Disruption of Communications
- Breakdown of Logistics Network
- Rolling Blackouts







Lessons from the Great East Japan Earthquake

- ◆ Necessary to reestablish comprehensive disaster management measures mobilizing all resources of Tokyo
- ◆ Cooperation between each stakeholder and mutually complementing measures, as well as enhancement of self-help, mutual assistance and public help are indispensable to seamless preparedness

3. Disaster Management after Great East Japan Earthquake

Concepts of Disaster Management Measures based on the lessons

Strengthen cooperation among stakeholders as well as reinforce each effort

- Cooperation among community members
- Stable communication tools
- Logistics and emergency stocks
- Stranded people measures involving entire society

Undertake multiple measures to secure backup functions

- Reduce close-set wooden housing areas and reinforce firefighting system
- Development of disaster preparedness facilities in cooperation with private sector
- Diversify sources of energy





- 3.5 million stranded people within Tokyo
- Traffic congestion
- Planned measures did not work during actual disaster
- Mobile phone network did not function

Lessons

- Enhancement of measures concerning stranded people is needed
- Comprehensive measures involving private sector and people themselves is necessary to deal with vast number of stranded people

Ordinance for Measures Concerning Stranded People

- 1 Preventing People From Heading Home All at Once
- Employers and schools need to make reasonable endeavors to confirm the safety of facilities and ask people to stay at the facilities, and stockpile 3 days worth of products.
- ➤ Railway companies and commercial facilities need to make reasonable endeavors to protect their customers by taking measures such as providing temporary shelters and providing guidance to safe locations.

2 Securing Temporary Shelters

> TMG needs to work on securing the cooperation of the national government, municipalities, and the private sector to secure sufficient temporary shelters.

Ordinance for Measures Concerning Stranded People

3 Providing Communication Tools and Information Services

- > TMG needs to work together with related organizations to publicize family safety confirmation services and to provide disaster information.
- Employers should prompt employees to prepare multiple methods to get in touch with their families.

4 Assisting People Returning Home

- > TMG needs to work on securing support stations to assist people walking home where water, lavatories, and other services are provided.
- TMG needs to work on securing alternative transportation such as buses and ships for railway users.

Incentives for Private Sector

- Subsidy for expenses of stockpiles for stranded people
- Subsidy for costs of temporary shelter facilities such as spaces, storages for stockpiles for private companies near terminal stations
- Tax exemption on storages for stockpiles for stranded people

Progress of TMG's Efforts

- Employees who stockpile water and emergency foods for their employers →50.1%
- Temporary shelters →918 shelters (able to accommodate 328,000 people)
- Support stations to assist people walking home → 10,851 stations (schools, restaurants, convenience stores, etc.)
