1. <u>Starting point</u>: What was the main challenge, issue, problem to be addressed by the practice?



Deepen urban and rural **poor people's networks** with regional coordination



Impact policy by demonstrating **community based development** on city and regional scale



Promote **co-productive partnerships** with a variety of stakeholders to ensure pro-poor outcomes



Keep record of **learning, monitoring & evaluation**

2. Institutional setting: What were the frame conditions for the practice that will be presented?

- National housing subsidy programme & the People's Housing Process successfully lobbying government for direct access to the housing subsidy program.
- SA SDI Alliance has been very influential in developing **slum upgrading policies** that actively involve the urban poor.





3. Approach: Which methods, tools or instruments have been developed and were applied to address the challenge?

- **Build Poor People's Networks** through tools for community organisation that include: women's centred savings groups, data collection, learning exchanges, partnerships, slum upgrading.
- **Community Based Development** through informal settlement upgrading and re-blocking and livelihoods support.



<u>4. **Outputs**</u>: Which were the concrete tangible results, outcomes and/or impacts of the good practice and how do they ensure sustainability of the practice?

- These activities support the development of co-productive partnerships for inclusive governance.
 - We seek strategic partnerships with government and other actors through formal MoUs
 - We prioritise poor communities as development actors through:
 - Saving brings about self-reliance, organised communities and leverages funds
 - Community data & mapping is basis for project planning
 - Innovative funding mechanisms: Urban Poor Fund Community Upgrading Finance Facility | City Fund
 - Joint implementation through community construction (PHP) or EPWP (upgrading)

5. Lessons Learnt: What are the main lessons learnt in the course of implementation of the good practice? Are there any open questions that need to be dealt with?

- Partnerships thrive with strongly mobilised and organised communities
- **Culture of savings** is important for self-reliance, organised communities, negotiating
- Empowering youth and women
- **Municipal willingness** to work with organised communities
- Signed partnership agreements
- Regular partnership meetings
- Clear communication and implementation follow through builds trust

<u>6. **Transfer**</u>: What are the necessary preconditions to transfer this practice to another place? What would be the first steps to take?

- **Community mobilisation** through women's centred savings groups, community-driven data collection, and learning exchanges with other organised communities of the urban poor.
- Community-driven implementation of precedent-setting upgrading projects.
- **Exposure of municipal officials** to the benefits of partnerships with urban poor communities through meetings and learning exchanges.



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
